We are part think tank group and part advocacy group. Although we strive to address issues of equity and justice systemically, our core constituency is primarily the African American community together with other communities of color. We collaborate with elected officials, grassroots organizations, as well as other advocacy groups and engage the community at large to support and strengthen policies that impact their lives. In a nutshell, a great part of our work consists of making the political process more responsive to the demands of these communities, many of whom have been traditionally underserved and/or overlooked, in their quest to strive for a more equitable, just and fair society. Essentially, our work is to assist lawmakers with databased evidence in the formulation of public policies while helping the community understand better the consequences of their actions (or inaction). We also organize forums and other events to educate the community on their rights and more importantly, to remind them of their civic engagement responsibilities with respect to the political process. This approach is borne out of our conviction that an informed citizenry is central to building and maintaining a vibrant democracy.

In order to complement the work we already do, I would like to introduce you to yet another new initiative of the Center. Every month, I will be sharing with you trending hot button public issues that need your attention. I will try in as much as possible to break them down into soluble pieces with the hope of provoking maximum response and positive action from lawmakers and especially from you, our core constituents. These briefs will be based on facts, they will be fair and non-partisan and for the most part, hopefully, very interactive. More often than not, we expect others to do for us what we can or should do for ourselves. This is your platform and your opportunity to express yourself, demand and claim your rights, and for Pete's sake, make your voices heard.
